RCIS Program Components

- Regional Conservation Investment Strategy (RCIS)
 - Regional conditions assessment with conservation strategy (goals, objectives, actions, and priorities)

Mitigation Credit Agreement (MCA)

 Advance mitigation credits to offset CESA, CEQA, LSA, & other impacts based on RCIS actions

Regional Conservation Assessment (RCA)

Ecoregional conditions assessment

RCIS Regional Conditions





RCIS Regional Conditions

- Existing habitats/land cover types
- Occurrence information for focal species and other conservation elements (OCEs)
- Existing protected areas
- Wildlife movement corridors
- Existing & foreseeable future development
- Pressures and stressors, including climate change
- Gaps in scientific information

RCIS Strategy

- Goals, objectives, actions, and priorities for focal species and OCEs
- Address the area's conservation needs, not just for mitigation credits
- Addresses the area's pressures and stressors
- Considers the ecological benefits of working lands

RCIS Development, Review, & Approval Process

- RCIS Development
 - Local stakeholder involvement
 - Public meeting
- Completeness Review (30 days)
- > Public Review (60 days minimum)
- > CDFW Substantive Review (~90 days)
 - Generally concurrent with public review
- > Optional Informal Final Review (~30 days)
- > Final Review (60 days)

RCIS Uses & Other Benefits

- Guides conservation and advance mitigation
- May be used to guide development
- Greater grant opportunities
- Based on the best available scientific information
- Developed at the local level, with state-wide consistency
- Public documents that may be implemented by anyone
- Non-binding on land use authority
- Voluntary; No conservation commitment

RCIS Considerations

- Prepared by public entity or federally recognized tribe
- Developed with stakeholder and public input
- Does not result in permits or approvals for actions
- 10-year term; can be extended
